



Capacity Statement

APMG is a sharply-focussed social enterprise that works to improve the reach, quality and impact of HIV prevention, treatment, care and support programs among the populations most affected by HIV. We are driven by a set of values that we use to guide the decisions about what work we take on and how we work. APMG works in close partnership with The HIV Foundation, sharing resources to create synergies between our work funded by international and national donors and our commitment to building the capacity of Most-at-Risk Populations (MARPs) to involve themselves fully in the global response to HIV.

The main communities of interest of both APMG and The HIV Foundation are:

- People living with HIV (PLHIV)
- Injecting drug users (IDUs)
- Sex workers (SW)
- Men who have sex with men (MSM) and Transgender People (TG).

At APMG, we focus on project management and capacity development. We work alongside policy-makers and program implementers to assist them to put in place the systems they need to plan, implement, evaluate and report on the work that they do.

Our work is backed up by a suite of training courses in program management among IDU, MSM and transgender people and sex workers that provide the basis for the development of long-term supportive skills-exchange relationships with our development partners. These and other training courses are shared by APMG with The HIV Foundation and its beneficiaries.

The HIV Foundation emerges from and works with the communities and populations most affected by HIV – particularly injecting and other drug users, gay men and other men who have sex with men, people living with HIV, transgendered people, sex workers. It seeks to foster the formation and development of organisations grounded in and comprising people from these populations, and to identify and strengthen leadership among these populations

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Work with Most-at-Risk Populations: APMG has worked extensively with people most affected by HIV to assist them to participate effectively in responses to HIV. With *PLHIV*, this work has included facilitating and reporting on a regional meeting of PLHIV in Central Asia to plan structured ways to involve PLHIV in health service provision to other PLHIV (USAID/Abt); assistance in capacity building to the All-Ukraine Network of PLHA to implement their grant as a Global Fund Principal Recipient; and research for a report on community care and support for MSM with HIV in Bangkok; training for people living with HIV in running self-help groups in Ukraine (MSF). We are also working with Australia's National Association of People Living with HIV (NAPWA) and Igat Hope (the Papua New Guinean national PLHIV organisation) to add PLHIV into clinical teams as HIV Health Support Officers in PNG. We have in the last three years also played a role in supporting HIV Treatments Literacy groups across Asia and the Pacific through the International Treatments Preparedness Coalition (ITPC).

With *MSM and TG*, our work has included developing background materials and workshop facilitation to develop a report on the role of civil society organisations in delivering the comprehensive package of HIV prevention, treatment and care services and programs to men who have sex with men and transgender people in Asia (RTI/APMG/ APCOM); developing a research project proposal to trial models of more effective HIV prevention, treatment and care among gay men and other MSM in Asia (amfAR); training government, UN and NGO managers from Middle East and North African countries in Managing HIV programs among MSM and TP (WHO); providing organisational development assistance to emerging civil society groups in Indonesia and Central Asia (including MSM and TG groups) (USAID/TRG; USAID/Abt); and supporting local initiatives across PNG in sites of increased risk, including sites where men have sex with men (AusAID/Cardno Acil).

With *IDUs*, this work has included developing key global guidance documents on managing needle-syringe programs (WHO), training outreach workers (WHO), reaching high coverage with harm reduction programs in developing/ transitional countries (UNAIDS), best practices in harm reduction in Russia (World Bank), Toolkit on Governance of Opioid Agonist Medication Treatment for the Asia region (AusAID); expanding Medication Assistance Treatment (MAT) in Central Asia (USAID/Abt); building capacity of the Russian Harm Reduction/ESVERO in its role as a GF Principal Recipient; building capacity of harm reduction NGOs in Indonesia and Central Asia (USAID/TRG; USAID/Abt); assessments of HIV IDU programs in Belarus, Russia, Bangladesh, China, Mauritius and Egypt among many other countries (various donors); and a wide variety of training programs including development and delivery of APMG's course on Managing IDU HIV Programs, delivered in Kazakhstan, Thailand, Indonesia and Turkey.

With *SW*, this work has included building capacity of SW NGOs in Indonesia and Central Asia (USAID/TRG; USAID/Abt); population size estimation and risk behaviour surveys of SW and IDUs in Tajikistan (UNDP); population size estimation of SW and IDUs in Macedonia (MoH); evaluation of SW and IDU programs provided by sub-recipients of International HIV/AIDS Alliance Ukraine as a GF Principal Recipient; and the current development of APMG's Managing SW HIV Programs training course.

Resource mobilisation through technical assistance to proposal developers and implementers of Global Fund HIV projects: Maximising the quality and effectiveness of Global Fund projects requires a complex mix of design, drafting, negotiation and implementation skills that rarely reside in a single person. APMG has been supporting the design, evaluation and implementation of Global Fund projects for several years and has developed a team-based support model that has proven very effective. Work with GF projects includes assistance in ***GF HIV proposal development*** through development of toolkits on proposal development for GF HIV proposals globally as well as specifically for proposals prioritising MARPs and those from the Middle East/ North Africa region (UNAIDS); development of a software package that assists countries to prepare their GF HIV budgets, workplans and indicator sheets; direct assistance to Armenia (RCC 2009), Bosnia and Herzegovina (Rds 8 and 9), Malaysia (Rd 9), and Tunisia (Rd 10); and reviews of Belarus (Rd 8, RCC 2009, Rd 10); and Maldives, Nepal, Mauritius, North Sudan, South Sudan, Iraq, Yemen, Syria, Morocco (Rd 10).

Our ***implementation*** work has included capacity development with Principal Recipients in Russia, Ukraine, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan and Tajikistan on governance, monitoring and evaluation, procurement forecasting, quality monitoring and models description. Other specific projects have included assisting the All-Ukrainian Network of PLHA in the development of their monitoring and evaluation framework and data collection system, and on governance and operational issues related to their dual roles as network of PLHIV and GF PR; population size estimation of injecting drug users and sex workers in Tajikistan and Macedonia; and technical assistance to the GF-funded program implemented by Ministry of Health in Egypt. In addition, APMG in a joint venture with AMAtech has developed a software package which assists in forecasting ARV and OI medication use to increase efficiency of procurement and supply management. We are also working with Country Coordinating Mechanisms to improve grant oversight in Bosnia and Herzegovina, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan and Tajikistan.

Our ***evaluation*** work has included assisting the GF Secretariat to evaluate the Proposal Forms used in Round 10 and to test the Forms to be used in Round 11; providing a case study of the Global Fund's work in Kyrgyz Republic with bilateral and multilateral partners, especially regarding prevention of stockouts; assessments of the GF-funded programs implemented by International HIV/AIDS Alliance Ukraine, Ministry of Health in Macedonia, National AIDS Secretariat in Mauritius and of harm reduction aspects of the GF-funded program implemented by UNDP in Belarus.

Building a competent workforce: APMG has multi-year contracts to assist in building capacity of civil society organisations in five Central Asian countries, Indonesia and Papua New Guinea. We are working with RTI International in China to assist the documentation of both models and outcomes, improvement and rollout of USG-funded HIV project activities among IDUs in Yunnan and Guangxi. APMG carried out a 3-year capacity building project with the International HIV/AIDS Alliance China program; assessed training needs and developed a five-year Training Plan for Human Resource Development for the Central Asia AIDS Control Project; developed WHO's training curriculum for national AIDS Program Managers in South-East Asia and for district health officers in Africa; developed and delivered training programs on participatory policymaking and assisting outreach workers help ex-drug users prevent relapse; and,

adapted global guidance materials and training curricula on strategic planning and programme management to the SE Asia Region (WHO SEARO)

Monitoring and evaluation: APMG has assisted HIV programs in monitoring their activities and evaluating their work, including developing a documentation, monitoring and evaluation (DM&E) framework for the Sustainable Development Program Community Conversations Initiative in Papua New Guinea; the assessment of data collection methods and results to meet draft coverage indicators related to HIV and injecting drug use in 9 countries (Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan, Russian Federation, Azerbaijan, China, and India) for UNODC; preparation of a series of 10 reports documenting the innovative models and lessons that emerged from the Drug Demand Reduction project in Central Asia (AOSI); (re)designing the M&E framework for GF HIV programs in Armenia (UNAIDS), Belarus (UNDP), Bosnia and Herzegovina (UNDP) and Malaysia (UNAIDS); designing a bottom-up documentation and M&E framework for a community conversations programme in PNG.

Policy, planning and enabling environment: APMG's work on HIV *policy* is wide and varied. It includes: assisting WHO to assemble its global corporate Plan of Action for Universal Access to HIV prevention and treatment; writing briefing notes and background documents for a speech by the UNAIDS Executive Director to the GF Board; developing a global report on the role of drug treatment in HIV prevention and treatment among drug users (DFID); developing a Discussion Paper on HIV/AIDS in Indigenous Communities (UNAIDS); assisting UNAIDS, UNODC and WHO to determine their roles and shared responsibilities in work on HIV and drug use in the MENA region; preparing a report for the Open Society Institute examining the extent to which most-at-risk populations are targeted in programming and resource allocation in 17 countries; assisting the International Committee of the Red Cross globally and a group of relevant UN agencies in Asia to determine how to deal with HIV issues in conflict, detention and emergency situations; developing provincial action plans to complement the Papua New Guinea Medium Term HIV Plan; and developing a HIV treatment, care and support strategy for the state of Tamil Nadu, India. Together with Vasson Consulting, APMG has also developed a consultancy package designed specifically to measure, improve and evaluate law enforcement obstacles to harm reduction implementation.

APMG has carried out substantial work on the use of data for *planning*, monitoring implementation and adapting plans to changing circumstances. Work in this area includes: assisting in developing the WHO/UNAIDS/UNODC *Technical Guide for countries to set targets for universal access to HIV prevention, treatment and care for injecting drug users*; sponsoring and editing the International Journal of Drug Policy's Special Issue on coverage of harm reduction programs; providing presentations, background papers and training sessions on development of coverage indicators for monitoring and evaluation for Middle East/ North African countries (WHO; World Bank).

APMG has worked with governments and NGOs to foster an *enabling environment*: i.e., one that encourages and supports effective policy responses through respect for the rights and needs of those affected by the epidemic. Work by APMG and its managing consultants has included: assisting International HIV/AIDS Alliance build capacity of community-based organisations in China by developing their relationships with

government entities; facilitation of workshops for the development of a voluntary counselling and testing scale-up plan in southern India (FHI); working with legislators to implement laws and legal policy that reflect a rights-based approach to the epidemic; assisting the establishment of regional networks in Africa and South East Asia to build coalitions between lawyers, NGOs, people living with HIV and government; advising on legal advocacy services for people with HIV in Ukraine; and facilitating workshops in Poland, China, Russia and Ukraine to raise awareness about the human rights dimensions of the epidemic.
